
EVERCREECH DESERVES BETTER

PEOPLE DESERVE BETTER

129 EXTRA HOUSES

The current proposal is for a dense urban style development right in the very centre of Evercreech. It will be more than double the density of Horsehill Meadows. Such a sudden influx of an estimated **350** people will have a disastrous impact on the roads, school, surgery and the Co-op and increase competition for local jobs.

1000 EXTRA CAR JOURNEYS

A potential additional **180 cars** could make up to **1000 extra** journeys in and out of the village daily, making Prestleigh Road and Victoria Square significantly busier and more hazardous than they are today. Residents on Queens Road will lose their parking places and Prestleigh Road residents will be unable to park outside their own homes.

ZERO JOBS

We need the right balance of homes and jobs for local people. With mixed use (including affordable housing plus light industrial/commercial units) the site could also provide much needed amenities for the village. The Co-op is keen to expand. Local estate agents say there is a demand for everything from workshops and offices to gyms and studios. Evercreech must remain a working village.

MINUS HISTORY

Fitting in such a high number of houses will involve the demolition of the historic former Kemp's Silk Mill and Creamery buildings and the loss of heritage and local character they represent, as well as detracting from the rest of the conservation area.
